ABOUT THE FUND

The Fund seeks to grow your capital and generate income primarily by investing in high yield bonds

It is an actively managed, well diversified porfolio mainly made up of sovereign and quasi-sovereign debt securities denominated in US Dollars

The Fund may invest up to:


- 10% of its net assets in Emerging markets.

The Fund can adjust its high yield exposure from 80% to 120% and its geographical allocation by varying its allocation to the US and European indices. It can also vary its exposure to interest rates by investing maily in US government bonds of differing maturities, the Fund does not invest in structured products.

High yield bonds are issued by companies whose business is more sensitive to the economic cycle and pay higher interest. The return on such securities, in the same way as their level of risk, is therefore higher than traditional bond products.

Exposure to high yield bonds is made through CDS (Credit Default Swap). A CDS is an instrument that gives investors exposure to high yield company debt. CDS are more liquid than high yield bonds and bear no interest rate risk.

GLOSSARY

Benchmark

Index used as basis for measuring the performance of an investment fund. Also called reference index or comparison index.

DerivativesDerivatives are financial instruments whose prices depend on the price movements in a reference variable, known as the underlying. Underlying assets may be shares, equity indices, government bonds, currencies, interest rates, commodities like wheat and gold, or also swaps. Derivative financial instruments may be unconditional forward transactions or they may be options. They are traded either on futures and options exchanges on standardised terms, or over-the-counter (OTC) on freely negotiated terms. Changes in the price of the underlying lead in certain situations to considerably higher price fluctuations in the derivative. Derivatives can be used to hedge against financial risks, to speculate on price changes (trading) or to take advantage of price differences between to speculate on price changes (trading) or to take advantage of price differences between markets (arbitrage)

Duration

Duration is the average time to payout. This key figure is used to measure the influence of interest rate movements on the price of a bond or bond fund. Duration is defined in years (e. g. 3-year duration means that the value of a bond would increase by 3% if interest rates fall by 1% and vice versa).

High-yield bond

Bonds with high interest rates and high risk exposure. The issuers of such securities are often companies with a low credit rating.

High-vield fund

A fund for high-yield bonds (i.e. bonds with low credit ratings).

A rating provides information about the creditworthiness of a debtor. The higher the rating, the less likely the debtor is to default. A distinction is made between high-quality (investment grade) and speculative bonds (high-yield or junk bonds). For investment-grade bonds, Standard & Poor's issues ratings from AAA to BBB, while Moody's ratings range from Aaa to Baa.

Credit default swap (CDS)
A credit default swap (CDS) is a kind of insurance against the risk of credit default.
Upon conclusion of a credit default swap agreement, the protection seller pledges himself to pay compensation to the protection buyer if a specified credit event occurs (eg default or late payment). In return, the protection seller receives a premium. The amount of the CDS premium depends primarily on the creditivorthiness of the reference debtor, the definition of the credit event and the maturity of the contract.

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
