





Performance commentary

Mid-July saw a turnaround from the uptrend with equities and yields. Japan, as the leader of the field, was hit first in the sell-off. The other regions followed suit at the end of the week on 1 and 2 August. The souring of investor mood was partly caused by political turmoil but also by a growing fear that heavy investments in artificial intelligence might not pay off as expected for top tech firms. The last straw was a disappointing non-farm payrolls report, though the US unemployment rate remains historically low.

Market comments

July was overshadowed by dramatic political events. Firstly, fears of a takeover of political fringe parties have all but paralysed French and British politics and revealed how dissatisfied a surprisingly high share of voters are with incumbent governments. Soon after, former US president Donald Trump was injured in an attempted assassination during an election rally. All the while current president Joe Biden finally followed repeated calls from Democratic Party leaders and donors to step down from the race. Thirdly, the heat is back on in the Middle East with reports of an imminent retaliatory attack on Israel by Iran and its proxies. This follows the assassination of a senior Hamas leader in Tehran, with Iran alleging Israel was responsible. Together with deteriorating economic data, we saw global equity flattening out, in tandem with speculations that the Fed might cut rates sooner than expected.

Comments on positioning

Equities, and predominantly US equities, are likely to remain volatile in the near term given the above-mentioned concerns. But we think the pullback in recent weeks has improved their risk/reward. We do not think recent events will change the overall outlook, and we maintain our neutral positioning on equities. The global momentum towards lower rates has continued to build, with the first cut of the cycle from the Bank of England. The Fed also gave its clearest signal yet last week that cuts are on the way. We therefore reiterate our most preferred stance on fixed income, and investment grade bonds in particular.
