Investment objective

The Sub-Fund seeks to achieve superior long term risk adjusted returns (i.e. returns adjusted for volatility) by investing primarily in equities and equity related securities of medium sized and smaller European companies over the recommended investment term (five years). Investors' attention is drawn to the fact that the management style is discretionary and integrates environmental, social / societal and governance (ESG) criteria. The portfolio composition will not attempt to replicate the composition of a benchmark index from a geographical or sectorial perspective. Even so, MSCI EUROPE MID CAP Net Return Euro Index may be used as an ex-post benchmark indicator.

To achieve its investment objective, the investment strategy is based on active discretionary management.

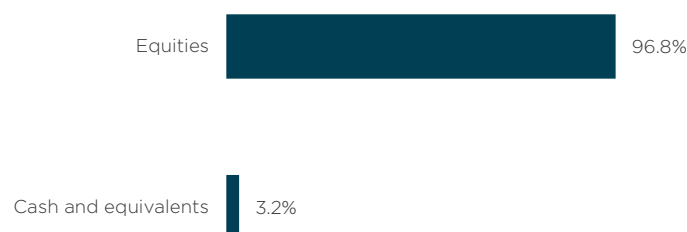

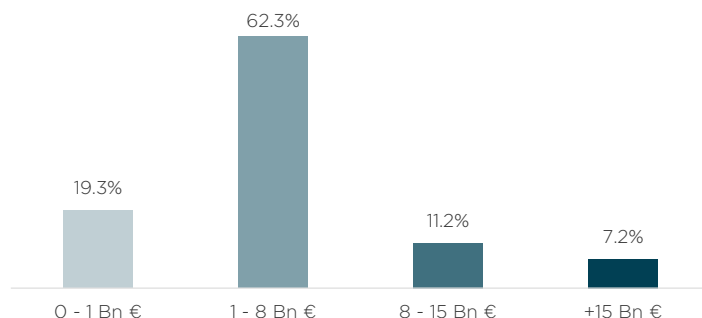

Portfolio managers comments

The fund invests in the attractive European mid-cap segment.

Our aim is to find the best value for money: in other words, to own companies with excellent fundamentals and solid prospects, while remaining rigorous in terms of valuation.

Since its inception, the fund has outperformed its benchmark 136.3% versus 85.45%.

September was marked by persistent volatility on the financial markets, reflecting an uncertain economic environment. However, the start of a new cycle of rate cuts and stimulus in China provided grounds for optimism.

Flutter Entertainment was the fund's biggest contributor this month. The Irish company, which specialises in online sports betting, held an investor day at which it presented its ambitious growth targets for 2030. Jumbo, a Greek discounter, published better-than-expected half-year results and should take full advantage of the winter season, which accounts for a substantial proportion of its sales. In addition, Süss MicroTec, a supplier to the semiconductor industry, notably in the field of advanced packaging, offers attractive exposure to the artificial intelligence value chain, with solid order books providing good medium-term visibility.

Danish insurer Alm Brand has completed the sale of its energy insurance business and is continuing a significant rerating process, supported by a stable dividend policy and a solid net cash position. Finally, Glenveagh Properties, an Irish property company, is benefiting from significant government support, with property prices well above construction costs, while the development of partnerships with local authorities offers strong potential for profitability.

The company that made the biggest negative contribution to performance was Next 15, a UK company specialising in IT communications, digital marketing and innovation consultancy services. It recently announced the non-renewal of a contract with its Mach 49 subsidiary, and reduced its estimates for the coming financial years. For its part, D'leteren Group, a Belgian holding company active in car distribution and glazing repairs, has published solid half-yearly results. At the same time, the group unveiled its plan to reorganise its family shareholding, which will now be concentrated in a single entity. This restructuring is accompanied by the payment of an exceptional dividend of €4 billion, which could result in a substantial tax loss.

In addition, Germany's Gerresheimer, a world leader in the manufacture of packaging products for the pharmaceutical industry, revised its sales and margin forecasts downwards for 2024 and 2025, due to a weaker and later than expected recovery in demand. Finally, the Dutch companies OCI, a producer of chemicals and fertilisers for industry, and Fugro, a major player in geotechnical engineering for the energy sector, were both affected by profit-taking, although their outlook remains very positive.

Adjustments have been made to the portfolio to further optimise it, with the aim of achieving the best possible combination of quality, improved prospects and value.

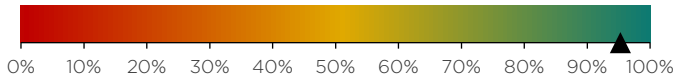

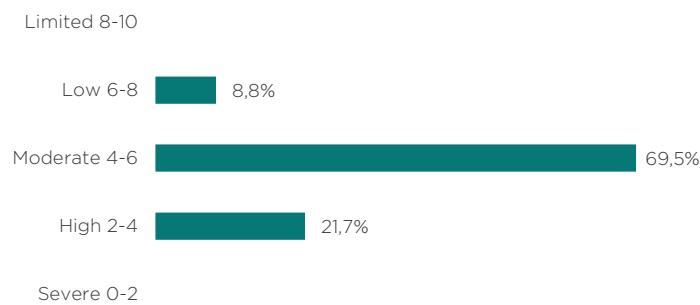

Average Responsibility Score: 4.7/10

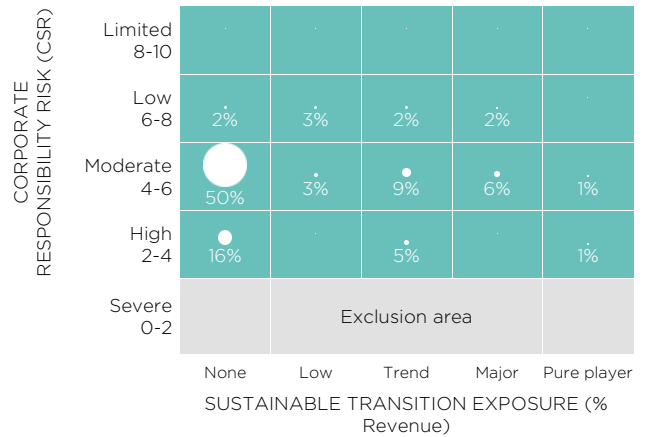
Responsibility risk breakdown⁽¹⁾



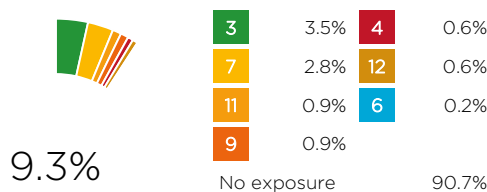
Selectivity universe exclusion rate



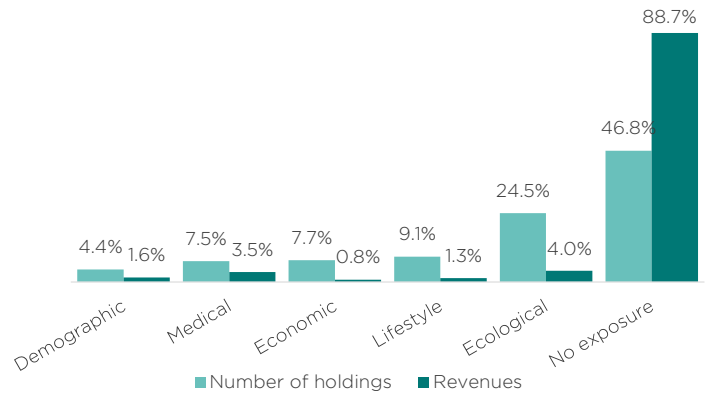
Transition/CSR exposure⁽²⁾

Analysis methodology

We develop proprietary models based on our expertise and conviction to add tangible value in the selection of portfolio securities. DNCA's ESG analysis model, Above & Beyond Analysis (ABA), respects this principle and offers a rating that we control the entire construction. ⁽²⁾ The ABA Matrix combines the Responsibility Risk and the Sustainable Transition exposure of the portfolio. It allows us to map companies to be mapped using a risk/opportunity approach.

Glossary

Beta. Measures the average extent to which a fund moves relative to the broader market. The beta of a market is 1. A fund with a beta of more than 1 moves on average to a greater extent than the market. A fund with a beta of less than 1 moves on average to a lesser extent. If beta is a minus number, it is likely that the stock and the market move in opposite directions.

Correlation coefficient. The correlation coefficient is a measure of correlation. It is used to determine the relationship between two assets over a given period. A positive coefficient means that the two assets move in the same direction. Conversely, a negative coefficient means that the assets move in the opposite direction. The correlation or decorrelation can be more or less strong and varies between -1 and 1.

Dividend yield. Annual dividends per share / Price per share

EV (Enterprise Value). Market value of common stock + market value of preferred equity + market value of debt + minority interest - cash and investments.

ND/EBITDA (Net Debt / EBITDA). A measurement of leverage, calculated as a company's interest-bearing liabilities minus cash or cash equivalents, divided by its EBITDA. The net debt to EBITDA ratio is a debt ratio that shows how many years it would take for a company to pay back its debt if net debt and EBITDA are held constant.

P/B. The Price to Book Ratio is the ratio of the market value of equity (market capitalisation) to its book value. It is used to compare the market valuation of a company with its book value.

P/CF (Share price/Cash Flow per Share). The price-to-cash-flow ratio is an indicator of a stock's valuation.

PER (Price Earnings Ratio). A company's share price divided by the amount of profits it makes for each share in a 12-month period. PE ratios are normally calculated on the base of all the profit made in the period, whether or not the profit is paid out to shareholders in that period.

ROE (Return On Equity). The amount of net income returned as a percentage of shareholders equity. Return on equity measures a corporation's profitability by revealing how much profit a company generates with the money shareholders have invested.

Sharpe Ratio. A way of measuring the historical risk-adjusted return on an investment. It is the average previous return minus the risk-free return, divided by the standard deviation (a measure of risk that looks at the diversion of actual returns from expected returns).

Sharpe Ratio. The Sharpe ratio measures the excess return over the risk-free money rate of an asset portfolio divided by the standard deviation of that return. It is therefore a measure of the marginal return per unit of risk. It is used to measure the performance of managers with different risk policies.

Tracking error. Tracking Error is a measure of how closely an investment portfolio follows the index against which it is benchmarked. It is the difference in the return earned by a portfolio and the return earned by the benchmark against which the portfolio is constructed. For example, if a bond portfolio earns a return of 5.15% during a period when the portfolio's benchmark (say, for example, the Lehman Brothers Index) produces a return of 5.06%, the tracking error is .09%, or 9 basis points.

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
