

# DNCA INVEST BEYOND SEMPEROSA

EUROPEAN EQUITIES FUND SRI



## Investment objective

The Sub-Fund seeks to outperform of the following index denominated in Euro: Euro Stoxx NR (Bloomberg ticker: SXXT Index) calculated with dividends net of withholding taxes reinvested, over the recommend investment term. Investors' attention is drawn to the fact that the management style is discretionary and integrates environmental, social / societal and governance (ESG) criteria. The sub-funds philosophy is particularly to focus on companies that have a strong social and/or environmental impact. This impact is evaluated through their exposure (in terms of turnover, R&D expenses or capex) via the proprietary model of the Investment Manager. The impacts are based on five long term transitions: economic transition, life style transition, medical transition, demographic transition and energy transition.

To achieve its investment objective, the investment strategy is based on active discretionary management.

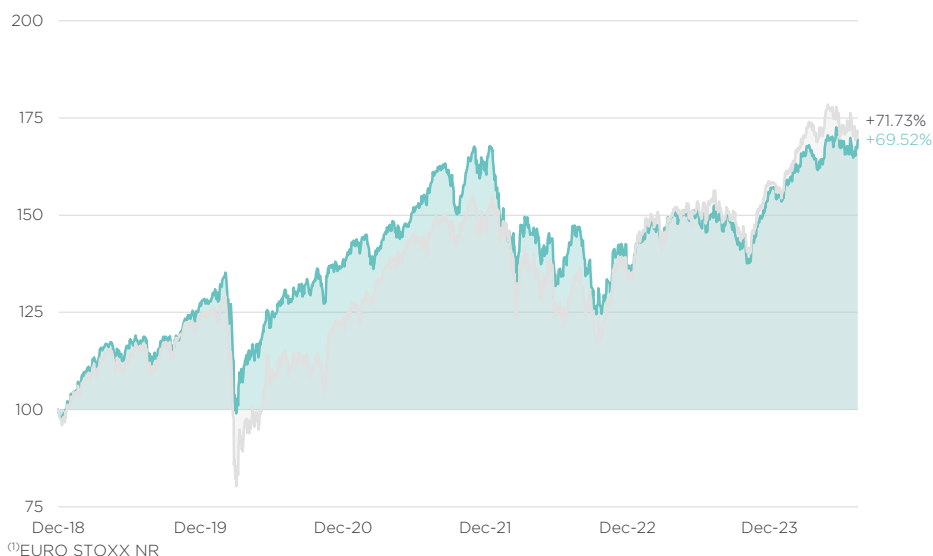

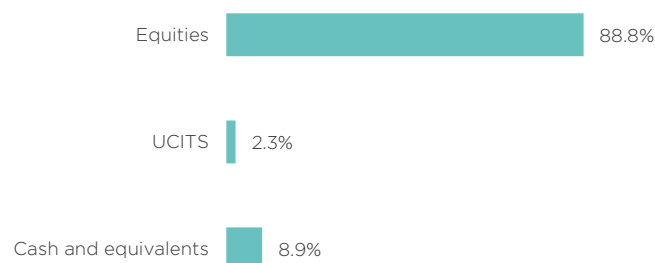

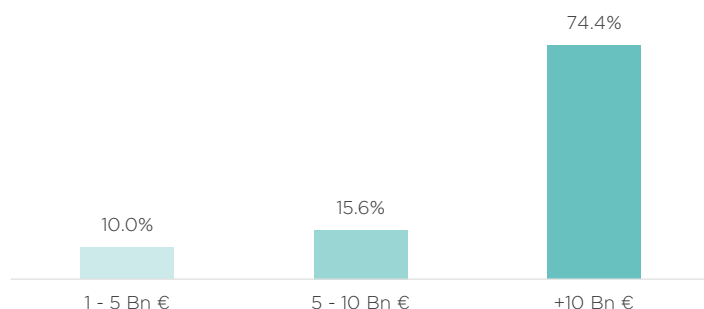

## Portfolio managers comments

European markets closed slightly higher in July. Volatility has risen sharply.

The political environment remains central. The French situation is at a standstill, with three major blocs emerging but no clear majority. The American campaign is in turmoil following Donald Trump's assassination attempt and the withdrawal of Joe Biden, who has been replaced by his vice-president Kamala Harris. The Republican candidate for the White House still has a lead, but the margin is shrinking.

From a macroeconomic point of view, strong GDP growth in the United States (+2.8% compared with the previous quarter) confirms the robustness of the US economy. US inflation surprised on the downside for the second month running. Headline inflation came out at +3.0% (vs. +3.3% yoy) and core inflation, which excludes highly volatile prices such as energy and food, at +3.3% (vs. +3.4%). However, the US labour market is beginning to show some signs of running out of steam. The pace of hiring in the private sector is slowing and the unemployment rate, at 4.1%, is rising for the third month in a row. The US yield curve has steepened considerably. Fed Chairman Jerome Powell hinted at a possible rate cut at the September meeting. In the eurozone, GDP rose by 0.3% in the second quarter. Business sentiment surprised to the downside. The composite PMI came in at 50.1, compared with 50.9 in June. Core inflation remained stable at 2.9%. Unsurprisingly, the ECB, awaiting reassuring inflation figures, left its rates unchanged. The third plenum of the Chinese Communist Party was disappointing, with no concrete measures announced. Long rates fell sharply.

So far, the publication season has been mixed. Quarterly results are solid on the whole, with 55% of European companies beating EPS expectations. However, the messages given to the market about future prospects are often disappointing. Many companies cut their annual forecasts. Two sectors suffered particularly badly: technology stocks were penalised by the United States' desire to tighten export rules to China, and luxury goods (a sector not included in the portfolio) by negative messages about the Chinese economy. Sectors with a defensive profile outperformed the market, such as Healthcare and Utilities.

In July, the fund posted a performance of 2.37%, compared with 0.6% for its benchmark index, the Euro Stoxx NT.

Over the month, the main relative outperformers of the stocks in the portfolio (versus Euro Stoxx) were : ID Logistics (Economic Transition, +53 bps, active weight +2.2%), Bureau Veritas (Economic Transition, +43 bps, active weight +3.0%), Lonza (Medical Transition, +39 bps, active weight +2.0%), Biomerieux (Medical Transition, +27 bps, active weight +3.0%), EDP Renovaveis (Ecological Transition, +25 bps, active weight +2.8%). Conversely, the relative worst performers were : Novo Nordisk (Medical Transition, -53 bps, moving average +4.8%), Amplifon (Medical Transition, -29 bps, moving average +2.2%), Mayr-Melnhof Karton (Lifestyle Transition, -10 bps, moving average +1.4%) and SEB (Lifestyle Transition, -7 bps, moving average +1.9%).

Over the period, exposure to OPMobility and Bureau Veritas was increased, while ID Logistics, Michelin, ASML, Givaudan, Sartorius Stedim, Huhtamaki, Novo Nordisk, Hera, Symrise, RELX and Biomerieux were partially reduced.

At the end of the month, the portfolio comprised 34 stocks. The portfolio's main convictions remained unchanged, with the following top 5 stocks: ASML (Ecological/Lifestyle Transition, > 6.0%), Iberdrola (Ecological Transition, > 5%), Astrazeneca (Medical Transition, > 4.0%), Novo Nordisk (Medical Transition, > 4.0%) and Bureau Veritas (Economic Transition, > 3.5%). Overall, the fund's top 10 holdings represent almost 42% of net assets.

The political environment will remain one of the main factors driving equity market performance and volatility in the third quarter, particularly in the United States. Although the US economy remains robust, the first signs of weakness could appear and fuel volatility, particularly in the labour market. Inflation data are pointing in the right direction. Monetary normalisation seems to be behind us.

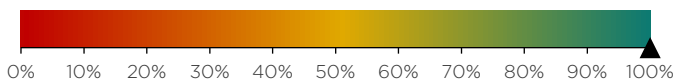

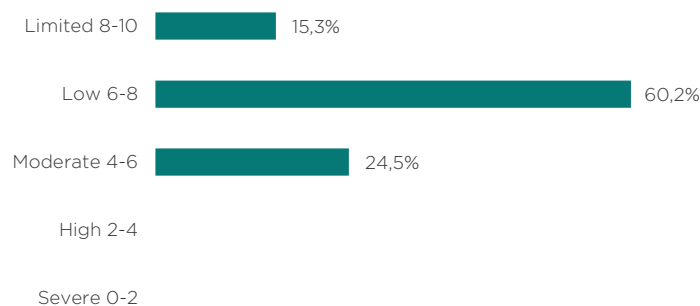

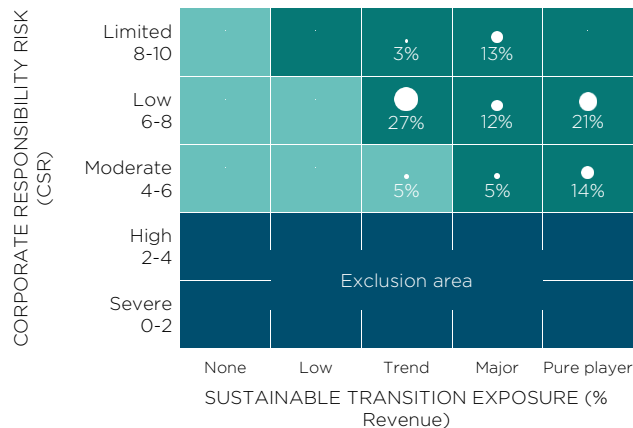
**Responsibility risk breakdown<sup>(1)</sup>**



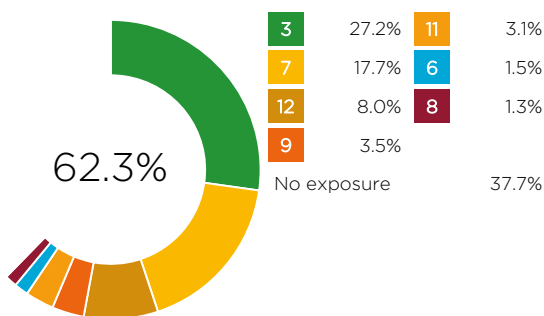
**Selectivity universe exclusion rate**



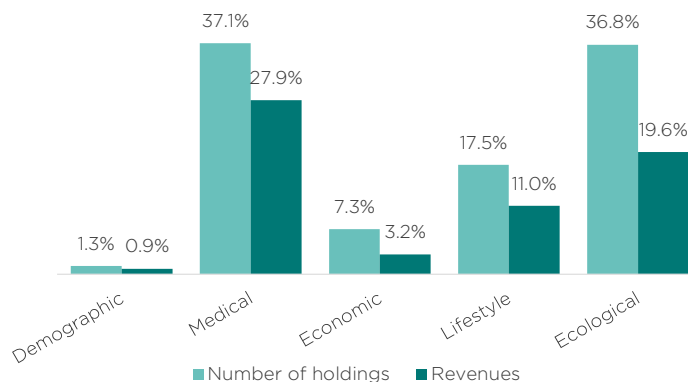
**Transition/CSR exposure<sup>(2)</sup>**

<sup>(2)</sup> The ABA Matrix combines the Responsibility Risk and the Sustainable Transition exposure of the portfolio. It allows us to map companies to be mapped using a risk/opportunity approach.

The Sub-Fund is managed taking into consideration responsible and sustainable principles and aims to be target issuers with a significantly exposure of percentage of their revenues to the 17 Sustainable Development Goals of the United Nations. The investment strategy is geared towards low carbon economy which leads to a lower portfolio's carbon footprint than the Euro Stoxx NR.

## Glossary

**Beta.** Measures the average extent to which a fund moves relative to the broader market. The beta of a market is 1. A fund with a beta of more than 1 moves on average to a greater extent than the market. A fund with a beta of less than 1 moves on average to a lesser extent. If beta is a minus number, it is likely that the stock and the market move in opposite directions.

**Correlation coefficient.** The correlation coefficient is a measure of correlation. It is used to determine the relationship between two assets over a given period. A positive coefficient means that the two assets move in the same direction. Conversely, a negative coefficient means that the assets move in the opposite direction. The correlation or decorrelation can be more or less strong and varies between -1 and 1.

**Dividend yield.** Annual dividends per share / Price per share

**EV (Enterprise Value).** Market value of common stock + market value of preferred equity + market value of debt + minority interest - cash and investments.

**ND/EBITDA (Net Debt / EBITDA).** A measurement of leverage, calculated as a company's interest-bearing liabilities minus cash or cash equivalents, divided by its EBITDA. The net debt to EBITDA ratio is a debt ratio that shows how many years it would take for a company to pay back its debt if net debt and EBITDA are held constant.

**P/B.** The Price to Book Ratio is the ratio of the market value of equity (market capitalisation) to its book value. It is used to compare the market valuation of a company with its book value.

**P/CF (Share price/Cash Flow per Share).** The price-to-cash-flow ratio is an indicator of a stock's valuation.

**PER (Price Earnings Ratio).** A company's share price divided by the amount of profits it makes for each share in a 12-month period. PE ratios are normally calculated on the base of all the profit made in the period, whether or not the profit is paid out to shareholders in that period.

**ROE (Return On Equity).** The amount of net income returned as a percentage of shareholders equity. Return on equity measures a corporation's profitability by revealing how much profit a company generates with the money shareholders have invested.

**Sharpe Ratio.** A way of measuring the historical risk-adjusted return on an investment. It is the average previous return minus the risk-free return, divided by the standard deviation (a measure of risk that looks at the diversion of actual returns from expected returns).

**Sharpe Ratio.** The Sharpe ratio measures the excess return over the risk-free money rate of an asset portfolio divided by the standard deviation of that return. It is therefore a measure of the marginal return per unit of risk. It is used to measure the performance of managers with different risk policies.

**Tracking error.** Tracking Error is a measure of how closely an investment portfolio follows the index against which it is benchmarked. It is the difference in the return earned by a portfolio and the return earned by the benchmark against which the portfolio is constructed. For example, if a bond portfolio earns a return of 5.15% during a period when the portfolio's benchmark (say, for example, the Lehman Brothers Index) produces a return of 5.06%, the tracking error is .09%, or 9 basis points.
