MARKET REVIEW

In October, the US constructive narrative continued amid solid economic growth and a resilient labour market. Most economic data released added support to the soft-landing narrative, or even a no-landing one, helping to push back against recession fears. It is worth noting that the stronger-than-expected US job data led to a sharp uplift in US yields and the USD versus most major currencies. The economic backdrop in the EU stands in stark contrast to that of the US, with recent weak Eurozone data, including contracting PMIs, softening inflation figures (below ECB target) and deteriorating consumer sentiment. In China, the various announcements in October were perceived as insufficient and fell short of the major stimulus expected from previous months' indications. In parallel, China-EU tensions escalated as China imposed anti-dumping measures on imports of brandy in a tick-tack response to the EU duty tax imposed on Chinese EV vehicles.

On the corporate front, the quarterly reporting season started. In terms of earnings surprises, small- and mid-cap companies have so far published sales and earnings in line with expectations. However, some areas of weakness have been seen in Industrials (Capital Goods) due to a slower recovery in certain segments (US Construction, Autos), in Materials due to weakness in pulp prices, and in Information Technology, with softer growth and recovery in industrial software and semiconductors.

PERFORMANCE COMMENT

During the month, the strategy lagged its reference index, predominantly due to the stock selection effect across Healthcare, Industrials and Utilities, which was not sufficiently offset by good selection in Consumer Staples. This selection effect is primarily driven by our thematic preferences for circular economy stocks, which led to some structural biases. For instance, we are structurally absent from Financials, Communication Services and traditional Energy, which were

the three strongest sectors in October. In addition, within Healthcare, we are exposed to equipment and life sciences rather than the more defensive pharmaceuticals. In parallel, we would tend to lean more towards cyclical sectors (e.g. Materials, Industrials). In summary, our thematic bias explains most of our lag, but we would expect it to revert in due course.

In addition to thematic headwinds, the strategy has seen volatility during the reporting season. The deceleration in economic activity has created cyclical headwinds in some segments, while we maintain our secular conviction in many of these structural growth companies. As such, among the largest detractors were Eurofins, which continues to see headwinds in biopharma spending exacerbated by company-specific contract cadence; BE Semiconductor, which remained under pressure despite strong growth trends, as the core electronics exposure remains depressed; and Agilent, which has seen cautious selling into results based on biopharma risks — a trend that was disproven during later results.

On the positive side, previous detractor Lamb Weston delivered results in line with our thesis on the short-term nature of headwinds, as did Darling Ingredients, which started reflecting the business recovery anticipated in the medium term. Smurfit Westrock advanced as it unveiled ongoing progress in the business beyond the merger.

FUND ACTIVITY

During the month, we initiated several new positions, capturing a range of secular growth opportunities.

In the shared economy space, we bought a position in Brambles, a pallet rental company for CPG customers, and Elis, a European flat-linen and workwear rental company. Both have benefited from the trends of outsourcing, gaining share from previously insourced activities as well as leading positions in their relevant markets. AGCO was another

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addition, a company in smart farming that we had previously owned, as we see the current cycle accelerating the positive outlook for its smart solutions.

To fund these investments, we exited, among others, John Bean Technologies on the relative risk/reward allocation.

Our thematic exposure remains tilted to bioeconomy solutions, which stand to benefit from regulatory support and lower cyclicality of environmentally protective solutions in the currently volatile environment. Our outcome-oriented economy theme has increased with new positions, reflective of more stable expectations for consumer behaviour.

OUTLOOK

In 2024, as the inflation battle seemed over, countries' monetary policies have now moved towards a more accommodative stance, with rate cuts across key economies, with the exception of Japan. The narrative of a soft landing is starting to take shape, potentially favouring a broadening of the equity market performance into the second part of 2024 and 2025, following performance having been concentrated in a narrow set of companies since 2023 and the flight away from smidcaps (i.e. the strategy's battleground). We continue to observe attractive market anomalies. Looking ahead into 2024 and 2025, we anticipate that a broader equity market performance would particularly benefit stocks that lagged in 2023-24, with a specific focus on small and midcap companies.

In this environment, we aim to complement our portfolio's barbell approach, which balances high-quality value and growth, with idiosyncratic opportunities driven by company-specific catalysts. We have observed a growing interest and understanding among investors in circular-economy solutions, which is supportive of growth and asset valuation. Currently, our areas of focus include performance and biobased materials, advanced manufacturing and exposure to enhanced infrastructure that promotes a sustainable future, spanning from waste and recycling to water management and environmental integrity. Both the regulatory environment and economic factors are unveiling new business models within various dimensions of our Fund's universe.

FUND STRATEGY

The Circular Economy strategy aims to capitalise on investment opportunities arising from the shift in economic models from linear to circular. This transition is centred on two main priorities: harnessing the power of nature and safeguarding natural capital.

The strategy's primary investment themes are closely tied to opportunities identified within four key revolutions associated with this transition: the circular bio-economy, resource efficiency, an outcomeoriented economy and zero waste. Across these four revolutions, the thematic investment universe encompasses over 250 companies, carefully mapped across regions and sectors. As a result, it presents a well-diversified investment universe that offers ample depth and breadth for our stock selection process.

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
