

AXA IM Swiss Fund - Bonds CHF A CHF

Fund Managers's Comment

Investment Goal

This fund invests primarily in CHF-denominated bonds issued by Swiss and foreign debtors in the investment grade category (investments with a minimum rating of BBB- according to S&P or Baa3 according to Moody's). The investment objective of the fund is to achieve a high level of regular income while ensuring capital security.

The Swiss Bond Index „AAA-BBB Total Return“ is used as a benchmark. The aim is to generate higher earnings through proactive duration and yield curve management and by over/underweight specific sectors versus the reference index. To complete the investment profile, we select specific securities and replace “expensive” bonds with other bonds on more favorable terms as a permanent process with respect also to their sustainability and the goal, to outperform the fund's average RI score versus the Benchmark score.

Markets and Performance August 2024

August was again driven from macro and therefore market participant's expectations with regards to upcoming Central bank decisions for the rest of the year (and beyond) at what pace rate cuts might take place. Main focus still on the US Fed, where expectations of forthcoming rate cuts did increase, this driven from suddenly declining growth indicators while inflation seems to develop, even if slowly but ongoing into the right direction. So, for the time being, market expectations still see the ECB with another 2 and the FED new now with even 2-3 cuts till end of the year, as for September the probability of a 50bps cut has increased.

US headline CPI in July came in another tick lower at YoY 2.99% (vs 3.0% in June), while also the core rate (ex-food and energy) was 0.1% lower than previous month with its 3.2%, which was fully in line with market expectations. Considering also other inflation measures as for example the lower PCE core deflator (2.6% unchanged versus June), the FED's most preferred inflation measure. Market hopes on even 3 cuts still this year were mainly driven from a surprisingly soft unemployment report for July, where the rate climbed from 4.1% to 4.3% but more importantly the change in nonfarm payrolls with its plus of 114k was far below market expectations and long-term average. No big change of the overall picture in Europe, despite that a first estimation for August-Inflation showed a 2.2% print (vs 2.6% in July), while the core rate came in almost unchanged at 2.8% from 2.9%YoY. The drop in headline inflation was widely expected and mainly due to base effects.

Away from that, risky asset classes such as equities calmed down again from their drop in late July/early August, regaining most of their losses during August. US Treasuries traded through the entire month therefore once again rather to the downside, coming from 4.02% till 3.80% to end up at 3.90%. Lack of any further new findings, German Bunds traded rather sideways in a narrow bandwidth of 2.30-2.20% to finish the month at 2.30% as was for end of July. Similar with the 10yr Swiss yield, reaching out for 0.38% from 0.45% but finishing August at 0.47%. The ongoing strong CHF currency, burdening local industry but also the CPI print for August (Headline again a tick lower to 1.1% from 1.3% while the core rate remained unchanged at 1.1% versus July) can be seen as rationale markets to expect the SNB to cut further in September and December this year..

No big surprise, new issue activities picked up in August again after the summer holiday break, coming in with CHF 7.6bn, which was truly bit less than August 2023 with its CHF 9bn. Despite the absence of the Swiss Treasury department, there seems a supply overhaul especially for high grade bonds, causing them to widen further while also Govispreads widened further... We strongly assume, the absolute low level of yields kept investors cautious. The focus was therefore rather on bonds from the Credit space where we saw Roche issuing a triple Tranche (almost 1bn) offering pickups of around 40bps for their 5, 10 and 15yr issuances. But also Geberit, or as a premiere Galderma (4yr +95 and 8yr +115; 250mn each) aside of PSP, Burckhardt and Zug Estates found their niche to issue successfully. Even the University hospital of Zürich, despite the hospital turmoil in local

markets, could issue CHF 300mn among two bonds (8yr +78 and 12yr +86). From abroad we saw EDF (green format, 5yr +95 and 8yr +108) worth to be mentioned. Away from that, as said, issuer like the city of Zürich (achieving among three bonds CHF 400mn “only”) or various issuances of Swiss Cantonal banks rather struggled to collect size from investors.

The fund’s duration remained very close to the benchmark duration with an almost neutral Alpha-Impact. We kept our underweight in mainly weaker Credit names (BBB/BBB- bucket) while we remained neutral to slightly overweight in other credits such as from the BBB+/A bucket which was again a rather neutral bet this month as well. Also our overweight in Pfandbriefe or public entities versus an underweight in Swiss Govis can be seen this month as overall neutral as both sectors widened similar versus Swap. The fund could benefit a little bit from new issuances, where we participated mainly in the new Roche but not only, selling elder bonds on more expensive levels as a switch..

The share class A (AXABDAI – ISIN CH0112537516 – Retail Class) performed during August with +0.26% (Benchmark +0.29%) and is YTD at +2.96% vs Bench +3.28% (0.31% underperformance). The share class I (AXABDII – ISIN CH0112537557 – Institutional Class) finished August +0.28% (-1bps versus Benchmark) and is YTD at +3.24% (-0.03% versus Benchmark). All figures are as usual reported net of all fees and costs.
