

Broadly positive total returns for 2024 were driven by diversified duration management.

# Monthly performance

In December the fund performed negatively with 1.3%. In December, negative duration in Canada and Japan contributed to total returns as yields rose, while positive duration positions across the US, the eurozone, the UK, Mexico and Brazil detracted. Exposure to credit was somewhat positive.

#### YTD performance

YTD as of the end of December, the fund has delivered a negative performance of 1.7%. 2024 was a rollercoaster year, with yields in the US ending higher than they were at the start of the year. Credit performed strongly, with spreads tightening over the period, led by high demand and a stronger-than-expected economy.

#### **Performance contributors**

In 2024, positive duration in the eurozone and negative duration across Japan and Sweden contributed to total returns, together with the curve steepening position in the US. Exposure to corporate credit across investment grade and high yield was also a contributor.

### **Performance detractors**

Entering 2024 with positive duration in the US was a detractor, as yields rose before we reduced our exposure. Positive duration across the UK, New Zealand, Mexico and Brazil, where yields moved higher, was also a detractor.

#### **Current investment strategy**

We are looking to tactically trade the new government bond yield range, with a strategic bias towards maintaining a long duration view overall as central banks are at the start of a ratecutting cycle. We own diversified exposure to credit and selected emerging market sovereign bonds, while looking to add to our holdings in the event of spread widening.
