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

In January, the Chinese economy faced a balancing act in monetary policy, with the People's Bank of China temporarily suspending treasury bond purchases due to limited supply and excess demand. The government also emphasised efforts to boost domestic demand via fiscal measures such as increasing pensions, salaries and subsidies.

Monthly performance

In January the fund performed positively with 0.2%. Fund performance was driven by lower Chinese rates over the month.

Performance contributors

Duration management, the overweight in Chinese government bonds, the underweight in policy bank bonds, as well as the overweights in state-owned enterprises (SOEs) and corporates, contributed the most

Current investment strategy

For China onshore bonds, we still believe that policy coordination will be much better than in the recent past, and we do not expect CNY rates to sell off sharply. This scenario would be supportive of the asset class. The asset class offers an attractive yield, as well as the benefits of diversification and a low correlation with the rest of the world.

Risks
