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

Global equity markets saw the US outperform, while fixed income sold off on the back of the US election before recovering towards the end of the month.

#### Monthly performance

In November the fund performed positively with 1.6%. The US was ahead of global equities, driven by risk-on sentiment following a red sweep. Fixed income yields surged following the election amid concerns about inflation and the deficit outlook. Credit spreads tightened in November.

#### **YTD** performance

YTD as of the end of November, the fund has delivered a positive performance of 10.2%. The momentum surrounding Al continues to slow as sectoral leadership moves away from expensive tech stocks. Fixed income markets are pricing out recession risks, driven by stronger-than-expected US activity data.

#### **Performance contributors**

Both equities and fixed income contributed positively to performance. Developed market equities drove performance, while global high-dividend stocks added value. Fixed income performance was positive across the board, with US high yield producing the largest contribution. The covered call strategy contributed positively during November.

#### **Performance detractors**

Real estate investment trusts (REITS) detracted from performance across the period.

# Current investment strategy

With signs that inflationary pressures are abating and growth is weakening, major central banks have kicked off their easing cycles and our base case for a US soft landing now seems largely reflected by market pricing. We believe that the risk/ reward profile for bonds is now more balanced from a duration perspective.

# Risks
