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

Macroeconomic data, politics and tariff threats, alongside developments in artificial intelligence, made for an eventful start to 2025.

Monthly performance

In January the fund performed positively with 1.6%. Global equities broadly rose in January but saw significant intra-month volatility as US tariffs created uncertainty. Global bonds, led by US Treasuries, sold off sharply before recovering towards the end of the month.

YTD performance

YTD as of the end of January, the fund has delivered a positive performance of 1.6%. Please refer to the section above.

Performance contributors

In January, equities and fixed income both contributed positively to performance. Developed market equities were the largest positive contributor. In fixed income, US high yield made the largest positive contribution, while emerging market debt also added value. For their part, real estate investment trusts (REITs) added value too. The fund's covered call strategy made a flat contribution on the month.

Performance detractors

There were no significant detractors from performance in January.

Current investment strategy

Amid signs that inflationary pressures are abating and growth is weakening, major central banks have kicked off their easing cycles and our base case for a US soft landing now seems largely reflected by market pricing. We believe that the risk/reward profile for bonds is now more balanced from a duration perspective.
